PROJECT HOPE GEARS UP AGAIN


It seems as if we just celebrated the new year, but here we are with Thanksgiving creeping up on the heels of Halloween. And after that, there's that buying frenzy time

As reported in American Demographics magazine, the survey was conducted in May by the online researcher Cyberdialogue, based in New York City. Surprisingly, in this youth culture go-go society and with all the talk of a generation gap, the response indicated that 81% viewed older people to be more of a gift than a burden. Respondents were also asked to describe "what you think 'retirement' would be like?" To that question 52% said it would be "fun", 29% said they had no idea what to expect, while 8% thought it would be "boring" and 11% expected "a health nightmare."


