Therefore, we are compelled to employ the active interest of the Nation as a whole through government in order to encourage a greater security for each individual who composes it....This seeking for a greater measure of welfare and happiness does not indicate a change in values. 

FOR ALL THOSE ON MEDICARE

In the <u>Medicare and You 2000</u> handbook, page 7, and in the more recent <u>Medicare and You 2001</u> handbook, page 9, you will find the following statement:

"Pap Smear, Pelvic Exam and clinical breast exam — ONCE EVERY 36 MONTHS. Once a year if you are at high risk for cervical or vaginal cancer or if you are of child bearing age and have had an abnormal Pap smear in the preceding years."

This shows a blatant disregard for women's health and, once again, women are being discriminated against. It is urgent for you to write your member of congress and senators about this policy. Women need to have their gynecological examinations *every* year. Write to the newspapers. Spread the word. It is urgent to get this policy reversed.
