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HEROES By Connie Gennaro

One of the most solemn sites in America is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery.

It dates from the first World War, which had been the worst war the world had ever experienced, and it represents the resting place of an unknown warrior from any one of the services.

Veteran's Day is the time to remember the sacrifice many made to keep us free. Everyone has had, or may still have, a service person in their lives, so it is fitting to know the particulars of this Tomb.

It was dedicated on Armistice Day 1921 (now known as Veteran's Day) by President Warren G. Harding. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Westminster Abbey, London, was dedicated in 1920 by King George V of Britain. The Tomb is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, regardless of weather. The sentinels follow precise procedures regarding the facing of east and west and must perform specific motions in a set number of seconds.

Army Guards are from the Third US Infantry Regiment and are known as the Old Guard. The Old Guard has served America since 1784.

The sentinels are between the ages of 19-34. They serve for 18 months. They hold no rank because the Unknown Soldier has no known rank and therefore cannot, and should not, be outranked.

The guard changes every thirty minutes when the cemetery is open and every two hours after the closing of gates at night.

All sentinels must swear to the Sentinel Creed which is quite comprehensive as to duty, honor and the solemnity of their task. It speaks of the honor and respect they have for all the fallen who gave their lives in the interest of us all.

They stand proudly, knowing that a grateful nation does not forget.

Every year the President of the United States lays a wreath at the Tomb on Veteran's Day.

On a column near the tomb is a Congressional Medal of Honor bestowed on the British Unknown Soldier presented by General Pershing in 1920.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS BEGINS WITH KNOWLEDGE

Our September meeting kicked off with the new retirees being introduced and welcomed into **ROBS**. New retirees not present have also joined **ROBS** and, hopefully, will attend other meetings and social events.

Our guest speaker was Dr. Tom Davies, who, with his brother Dan, has a podiatry practice in East Islip. I have been a patient of theirs for over twenty years. Both Tom and Dan are Brentwood grads. Tom graduated in 1971.

He spoke to us about wellness and health. He supports products from a company called Melaleuca which only uses organic and healthy ingredients. There are, of course, other such companies.

More importantly, he spoke about the harmful ingredients in every day items. We use them, rarely, if ever, inquiring about their ingredients. We know we can't sip lemon scented Joy dish detergent--it washes dishes, and Windex cleans windows and Tide our clothes. But long-term exposure to ammonia and bleach can have health consequences as harmful as smoking. We've all seen the law firm commercials on TV about Monsanto's Round-Up weed killer and its possible connection to Non-Hodgkins lymphoma. No mention that the stuff sprayed on weeds may kill them but what about the flowers next to the weeds or the veggies grown in the same bed? Don't the harmful ingredients transfer to our vases and salads?

Products to be concerned about range from Lysol, Formula 409, Dawn, Drano, Endust, Pine Sol --think of a product and it will be on a hazardous list. If that wasn't enough, there are also carcinogens (chemicals that cause cancer) and neurotoxins (chemicals that can affect the nervous system, mental alertness and coordination) in products like Speed Stik Deodorant, Crest Tartar Control, Ban Roll -On, Dove and Irish Spring. There are also harmful ingredients in make-up and shampoo.

Gone are the days when hazardous ingredients were labeled with a skull and cross bones. They are now on our bathroom vanities and

under the sink.

He does not mean to alarm us into throwing out all our products. He only wants to point out that before we use one we should understand what's in it. I use all the products mentioned. Have I had a problem using them? No, but I use a plastic glove when using some of them. Every day, we are confronted with this product/food/diet that was good for us yesterday and is no good today.

Johnson's Baby Powder is now linked to ovarian cancer. Who didn't powder a baby with Johnson's or wash their hair with No Tears Shampoo? There are no tears because something is inhibiting the tear ducts.

Wellness includes not only healthy eating and exercise but also healthy snacks and informed choices. NEVER stop taking your prescribed medicine but understand all meds have side effects. We need, as seniors, to take charge of what we use or eat so we can stay healthier longer.

A STORY ABOUT SOMEONE WHO WASN'T

Sometime around 1963, a family, like many others from the previous decade and for the decades to come, moved from Brooklyn, NY to Brentwood, Long Island. They had been working on building a house on a piece of property they'd bought about a block off of a dirt road called Fifth Ave., just north of the yet to be finished Southern State Parkway. The oldest daughter, Carmela, already had enough credits to graduate from high school, but because of her young age, she was enrolled for a final vear at Brentwood High School. In addition to her classes, she served as a student worker in the Instructional Media Center, a department run by Alfred Grabowski. Back then, the student workers were trained to help with all of the latest state of the art technology, which included projectors for filmstrips and 16mm movies, as well as portable record players that were capable of playing at all the speeds (16, 33 1/3, 45 and 78).

By the time she graduated in 1964, Brentwood decided that they liked the concept of student workers so much that they created an actual program, the Business Experience Students (B.E., for short), using the work of former students, Carmela among them, as their models. The B.E. girl who wasn't (more rightly considered a pre-B.E. girl) took the Civil Service test, and was hired by Brentwood as a Clerk Typist, working for Rita Brooks in the District Principal's office.

Her title of Clerk Typist didn't change for quite a while, although upon realizing the caliber of worker they had in their midst, Brentwood changed her job description multiple times, adding more and more responsibilities to her plate. This all eventually changed when, during a district re-organization, the Personnel Department was created, utilizing the talents of

Adrienne Eastman, Eileen Kelly and of course, Carmela Criscione. By the time Superintendent G. Guy DiPietro was at the district helm, the department, then known as Pupil Personnel Services, was split into two parts. Jack Smith directed Pupil Services, while Employee Personnel was under the watchful eye of a certain Senior Clerk (you guessed it). While still a



Senior Clerk, Carmela was bearing many of the responsibilities of an administrator (without the salary, of course). This was the second time, because of her skills, abilities and dedication, that Carmela was considered the woman who wasn't; only this time, she was the District Administrator who wasn't.

Upon yet another district reorganization, the department evolved into what is now known as Human Resources, an entity in which Carmela, in her new title of Administrative Assistant (still an Operational Supervisor, something from the Civil Service table of organization, and quite literally, an administrator who isn't) with Elaine Levy and their able secretaries, helped solve the problems and answered the questions of virtually every employee in the Brentwood school District. By this I mean, EVERYONE, from the summer, part-time, student worker to the Superintendent and School Board. Everyone who was hired or retired, who got sick or pregnant or served jury duty or worked previously for New York State or who had a question pertaining to any of these, as well as a mountain of other scenarios. If Carmela didn't know the answer, she would find the answer and we all, myself included, benefited from her determination.

She retired in 2001, having somehow acquired even more responsibilities and a new title, Human Resource Officer (still under the Civil Service umbrella). Naturally, she gravitated in the direction of the group of people she spent her entire career working **ROBS**. But even with the Retirees of Brentwood, she was a sort of an enigma. She wasn't a teacher; neither was she technically a member of the clericals. She wasn't officially an administrator. To the best of my knowledge, she was all of these, yet missing one element from each category to be, according to the definitions existing at the time, a member. Carmela worked for ROBS Cares; that wing of **ROBS** that sends out cards (greeting, congratulations, condolence, etc.) to its members. In time, when the need arose, she worked with Phyllis Goodwin on the **ROBS** Newsletter. In the roughly ten years that she was its editor, they have, almost annually, garnered from two to four awards, including Best Issue and Best Article. She has been helping people without official membership in any of these specific groups since the sixties. Her purpose has never changed since then: Do the best vou can for the people who depend on you. Always be honest. Always be fair. Actually, it's a pretty reasonable mantra.

For many and varied reasons, Carmela has chosen to close these Brentwood chapters in her life, to begin a new chapter in Lakeland, Florida, where the sun always shines and the flowers always bloom. It gives one pause to wonder just who she will offer her help to here.
