NEWS FROM AFT: Inside AFT/Retiree News - 6/02

On June 12th, the U.S. Senate rejected a GOP-led effort to permanently repeal the federal estate tax, which only affects the wealthiest Americans. Earlier, the House had voted to repeal the tax - a move criticized by the AFT as being excessively costly. The Senate rejected the bill when it voted 54 - 44 against waiving the budget act; 60 votes was required to bring the bill forward. Permanently repealing the federal estate tax would have cost more than \$850 billion over the next 20 years, the AFT noted as it opposed the permanent repeal. Two Republicans - Lincoln Chafee of Rhode Island and John McCain of Arizona -voted **against permanent repeal**, as did independent Jim Jeffords of Vermont. Among the Democrats voting **for repeal** were Max Cleland and Zell Miller of Georgia. (Members take note: letters might be good).

Medicare Lock-in Postponed. On June 13th, President Bush signed legislation postponing the Medicare lock-in until 2005. Until this law was signed, people with Medicare were restricted to one health plan change from

January 2002 through June 2002, either to a Medicare HMO or traditional Medicare, and then would be locked into that option for the rest of the calendar year. The new law allows people with Medicare to enroll and disenroll from an HMO at any time. Enrolling in a new Medicare HMO will automatically disenroll you from your former HMO. As part of a trade off for postponing the lock-in, HMO's can now file their premium and benefit information by the second Monday in September rather than July 15. From 2002 to 2005, the start date to select a Medicare HMO (open enrollment period) has been moved from November 1 to November 15. The annual election period ends December 31.

In 2001, the drug industry's lobbyists outnumbered all the 535 members of Congress. According to Public Citizen's report, there were 623 lobbyists, and drug companies spent 16% more on lobbying.

NYSUT Member Benefits announced its new Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance Plan, featuring Assist America and an education benefit. According to Walter Dunn, Jr., NYSUT Second VP who oversees the department, "This program was developed at the request of retirees and should be beneficial, especially for those who travel."

This plan provides 24 hours a day, 365 days a year coverage in or away from home.

Assist America provides world-wide medical emergency services when traveling 100 miles or more from home or in a foreign

country. This service refers insureds to qualified English-speaking physicians or medical facilities in other countries, secures hospital admissions in other countries and returns seriously ill or injured insureds to the U.S.

Annual premiums range from \$12 to \$48 for individual coverage and \$18 to \$72 for family coverage.

We would also like to thank Karen Storjohann for taking over for Lynn when she was unable to continue in the remaining year of her term. Karen effectively ran our elections, and her keen perceptions often carried the day. A very special thank you to: Lilian Kelly for her wonderful work as Treasurer of ROBS. Lilian's bookkeeping has kept us solvent for many a year; Ruth McCalla and Harriet Pepine for setting up interesting programs for ROBS meetings; John Sherin and Karen Storjohann who have supplied us with exciting history videos; Chris Veech, who has worked diligently to see that our Newsletter is coordinated for processing in Albany; Frank & Vern Spencer who have continued their work with Project Hope and the mentoring program; Adrienne Eastman who has kept us abreast of the new clerical retirees; Marge Kirchner who has sent ROBS wishes, on both good and sad occasions, to the membership. We still have three at-large positions to the executive board which we will vote on at our September meeting. We also need a Coordinator of Communications. I would like to have more secondary people involved in the operations of ROBS, and we encourage you to consider getting involved. Everyone is welcome to join our committees to help provide ideas and direction.

Last year ROBS had its first Brentwood scholarship recipient funded by a grant from RC 21. This year we were able to sponsor two scholarships: Alan Phillips will attend SUNY Purchase; Shanelle Kong will attend St. John's. We would like to keep this tradition in place for more Brentwood graduates going into teaching to receive a stipend from us.

Thanks to Dot & Jack for their help this year. Dot literally gave up an arm and a leg to run this year's most successful NYSUT Workshop on Consumer Fraud. Congratulations. Jack has done his usual yeoman's job of keeping our membership records straight.

Which brings me to one of my least favorite subjects – money. Next year the **dues will increase by \$5 to \$20**. Several years ago, we reduced our dues from \$15 to \$10. The overall economy forced us to return to the \$15 assessment, with \$5 going to RC 21 for your participation fee. Our membership is almost 400, (25% are 75 and older and therefore qualify for free membership if they have been a member for the previous two years). We have tried to defray our operating costs by sending our ROBS Newsletter to Albany to be printed and mailed. This, in turn, has necessitated more flyers and meeting reminders to the membership. Some of our members are not receiving our Albany mailings (due to a number of factors concerning NYSUT mailing lists), so we must print extra copies to send out. On July 1st, postage will increase to \$.37 for first class mail. We are a non-profit organization, but we are not tax exempt and must pay full costs. Our dues structure is the lowest of the 10 districts in RC 21, with some districts paying as much as \$75.

Please pay your membership fee promptly. With our current January 1 to December 31 fiscal year, we are still receiving membership dues in May. We have now moved to a fiscal year of July 1 to June 30, which means we start our membership NOW, (see application form elsewhere in this newsletter). In order to be placed in our Directory, dues must be paid by October 15th. **The next Directory will be sent in November and guarantees that everyone will have it for the holiday season.**

A Life Insurance Policy for You

The basic premise of life insurance is simple - your beneficiary receives a death benefit when you die. Then why are there so many kinds of life insurance? Coverage decreases with age and ends at age 85.

If you are looking for a cash value plan, NYSUT offers two distinct options. Both are based on universal life insurance structures. **NYSUT Variable Universal Life Insurance** is "permanent" insurance; it contains both insurance and cash value accumulation. You can choose to invest your cash value in fixed and/or variable investment options. You have premium payment flexibility. Death benefits are level or increasing. At age 100, the life insurance coverage ends and you receive the account value. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 80. The minimum face value amount offered is \$50,000; the maximum is \$500,000. Loans are available.

If you prefer not having to make investment choices, the **NYSUT WrapPlan® Term Life**

Coordination Program may be an option for you. This product "wraps" around existing term life insurance coverage to restore full coverage when term life insurance decreases or terminates. While there are no investment options, guaranteed interest rates provide cash accumulation. At age 95, the life insurance coverage ends and you receive the account value. Applicants must be age 65 or under and can apply for up to \$300,000. Loans are available.
